
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## **IMPROVED HOME EFFICIENCY:** a resolution with a big impact

at more vegetables. Eat less chocolate. Exercise three times per week. New Year's resolutions give us the opportunity to start fresh and consider changes to our habits that lead to personal improvement. But what if our personal resolutions had a bigger overall impact, such as on our wallets?

Well luckily, there's one that can—a resolution for a more energy efficient 2017. Collectively, small changes add up to big savings, and a resolution for improved efficiency at your home could benefit not just your personal budget but also the environment.

Consider these five low- and no-cost tips to increase your home energy efficiency in 2017.

- Make power strips work for you: Plugged-in appliances and electronics use small amounts of power even when they are turned off. This is called phantom energy use, and it can be eliminated—with the flip of a switch—if your electronics are plugged into a power strip. According to Energy.gov, you can save \$100 per year by using power strips to reduce phantom load. Just be careful to never overload a power strip.
- Use sunlight to help heat your home: On bright, sunny, winter days, open your blinds or curtains to let the natural light from the sun warm up your home. Be sure to close your window treatments as the sun begins to set to keep the warmth in.
- **Save hot water:** It takes energy to heat water, and you can save energy by: 1) Adjusting your water heater's setting to 120 degrees Fahrenheit. If you've never adjusted it, chances are it is set at 140 degrees. 2) Installing low-flow showerheads, which not

only helps lower your energy bill for heating the water, but it also helps lower your water bill because you'll use less. 3) Washing clothes in cold water.

- Install a smart or programmable thermostat, or be diligent about adjusting yours manually: According to Energy gov, you can save as much as 10 percent on heating and cooling per year by turning your thermostat back 7–10 degrees for eight hours a day in the winter and by setting it that much higher in the summer. You can do this while you're away during the day, as well as overnight. If set, smart or programmable thermostats can do this automatically, and you can achieve the same savings by remembering to adjust your manual thermostat.
- Understand more about your home energy use: Knowledge is power, and Pee Dee Electric offers several ways for you to learn more about your home energy use so you can make informed energy decisions. Log on to our customer service web portal, or install the PeeDeePower app, and start tracking your daily energy use so you can understand the factors that influence it. Also consider our Prepay program where you pay for your electricity in advance. Prepay helps create a stronger connection between energy use and budgeting, which often leads to improved energy decisions.

Creating a more energy efficient 2017 is not only a great resolution, but it's also an easy one to keep.

s the nation prepares to welcome a new Congress and Administration, America's electric cooperatives are ready to welcome back old friends and introduce ourselves to newcomers. balances cost, environmental concerns and the reliability of our nation's electric system. Elected officials will be making decisions affecting every aspect of the electric system, including the cost of electricity to consumers.

Advocating for these issues is nothing new. In fact, we've been doing it for over 75 years. And we're ready to continue this mission on your behalf. By adding blankets to beds and sofas, and wearing layers of warm clothing, you'll be cozy and comfortable even if your home is a few degrees cooler.

#### Stock up

Winter conditions, especially icy precipitation, can cause power outages. Just in case, keep emergency supplies on hand. Include flashlights and extra batteries, food and water (for humans and pets), essential medications, salt for icy sidewalks and driveways, and a battery-powered radio to stay connected.
